

It is often assumed that the summer break that's such a central feature of our culture harkens back to the more agrarian culture of our country's beginning. Since kids were expected to work in the fields of the family farm, school was set aside for the summer months. This, it appears, is a myth. In fact, kids often did the most work during spring planting and harvesting in the fall. Records indicate school years as long as 250 to 260 days pre Civil War. Rather than being a feature of farm life, "summer vacation" coincides with a rise in the middle class and the growth in cities. People started leaving these burgeoning "concrete jungles" during the heat of summer. This included the schools which were often sweltering before the days of air conditioning. Businesses and vacation destinations got in on the game and the lazy days of summer became a prime season. However, most educators recognize that one of the biggest challenges is the issue of retention. The first days of the school year are often focused on reviewing what had been forgotten over the course of three months. Such a challenge explains the rise in year round schools over the last couple of decades.

I think a similar concern can be found in churches. As things slow down during these months, there are some features of church life and even our own spiritual lives that can take a back seat. So how can we manage the summer slump? A simple solution is found in the essential expectations of the church laid out in Acts 2:42. After the church is established at Pentecost the book of Acts offers a description of the priorities of these first believers. "And they continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in prayers." Before we note the specific actions detailed in this verse, note the attitude. It says that they "continued steadfastly." The NASB uses the phrase "they were continually devoting themselves." In other words, the verse lays out for us the foundational practices which made the church strong and effective. We can manage the summer slump when we manage ourselves...

1. Theologically – The first phrase is first for a reason. It establishes the single most important feature of church health.

These believers gave themselves to the apostle's doctrine. In other words, they were theologically driven. We can maintain spiritual health and vitality when we continue to feed our hearts and minds biblical and theological truth.

2. Relationally – the next two phrases speak to a commitment to relationships among these disciples. It says that they gave themselves to fellowship and then further adds "in the breaking of bread." Not only did they view themselves as being intimately related to one another through the gospel so that they shared life together, but they illustrated this commitment through taking the Lord's Supper. Though we often associate the "breaking of bread" with eating a meal, it actually refers to communion. As we hit these months of time off and vacation, do not forget your brothers and sisters in Christ. Keep your fellowship active and vital.
3. Spiritually – then it says that they gave themselves to prayers. This could include both private and corporate prayers. In other words, the church also committed itself to engaging in those practices that enhanced their spirituality and their growth. Continue to practice those habits which help you grow in your faith.

If you read the rest of the text it also highlights the practical expression of the faith of the church. These first Christians engaged in a number of practical ministries which further strengthen the church. Don't let the summer pass you by without being involved in service. Though our schedule looks a little different from June to August, there are plenty of opportunities to be involved. Furthermore, look for opportunities to reach out to those in our community who have no church home, those who have no relationship with Christ. By all means, take some time off this summer, but don't leave your faith at the beginning of summer and think you can just pick it back up again in September. I pray this summer season will be a fruitful season of faith and obedience to Christ.

Worship & Music Notes

Postures of Worship

Psalm 95 is a call to worship that shows us three postures of worship. It shows us that God cares about how we approach Him in worship and that he has instructed us how to rightly approach Him.

1. Approach God with joyful exuberance. (Psalm 95:1-5) We have an audience with the King! Except our God is not like earthly kings: he is a great King and a great God above all gods! We reflect God's greatness—his transcendence—when we lift our eyes up and approach him with joyful exuberance. This great King has invited us into his presence—but not only that, He also made it possible for us to be in his presence. We are able to approach the throne with boldness, confidence, and joy because our status before God has been established through our faith in Christ. We have His righteousness and standing. We are joint-heirs with Him.

2. Approach God with humble reverence. (Psalm 95:6-7a) Our thankfulness before such a powerful *and* merciful God should drive us to our knees. Although we rejoice at our standing before God, and we approach His throne with boldness, we ought not

forget that He is God and we are not. Thankful people are not haughty or presumptuous. We are his people; He is our Lord. We are sheep; He is the Shepherd. He lowered Himself when he came to earth as a man to pursue reconciliation with sinners. We reflect God's nearness—his immanence—when we bow before Him in reverent awe and thanksgiving for his compassionate mercy and care.

3. Approach God with true belief. (Psalm 95:7b-11) Most of all, we must approach God with true belief. Unlike the first two postures in the psalm, belief is a condition of the heart rather than an outward expression. The first two postures are merely the outward expressions of genuine faith. This warning against hardness of heart tells us that it is possible to put on the *outward* displays of worship—to perform outward acts of apparent praise, respect, and reverence—without genuine *inward* belief. But God is not fooled. He sees our hearts. "Hardness of heart" is simply a way of saying "unbelief." The warning against hardness of heart is a warning against false conversion and spiritual deception. "Examine yourselves, to see whether you are in the faith," says Paul to the Corinthians. And so should we.

Recently, I had a conversation concerning the status of the church (not Tabernacle specifically, but the church in general), and how so often, professing Christians can seem quick to sinfully bicker, quarrel, or gossip about one another rather than loving and seeking to build one another up (rather through encouragement or loving rebuke). As we were talking, the conversation turned to how other organizations in the secular realm, composed in many instances by avowed non-believers (whether they be sports teams or fan groups, choir ensembles or acting troupes, political parties or civic organizations), often seem to do a better job of loving, encouraging, and cooperating with one another than many local churches do.

This conversation made me think of my own experience on various soccer teams growing up. With each team that I was a part of for as long as I can remember, I found myself sweating, sacrificing, and expending great effort—not primarily for individual accolades, but for corporate success. Oftentimes, being part of the team meant laboring alongside other young men that I had little else in common with other than an appreciation for the sport and a common goal to pursue. The camaraderie that was built was not a result of complementary personalities or a slew of common interests. Rather, it resulted from a common desire to win and the realization that, in order to do so, we would need to help one another to be the most effective that each of us could be in our respective position or role on the team. That, in turn, would ensure the best possibility for a successful season. Not that there wasn't the occasional clash of personalities or heated exchange between teammates, but these would be worked through, or overlooked, so as to remain focused on the larger goal. More often than not, this commitment to teamwork resulted not only in a successful season, but also to a greater interpersonal bond amongst my teammates than had originally existed. No, we weren't all best friends by the end of the season, but there was a healthy respect for one another that

culminated from all of the hard work and dedication exhibited by each member throughout the season.

I wonder if we, as the Church, couldn't learn at times from considering such examples. After all, we have a much greater reason to be committed to a common purpose than any secular organization does. As members of the body of Christ, we understand that we are not our own, but that we have been bought at a price (1 Cor. 6:19-20) and fashioned into one body (1 Cor. 12:12-27) in order that we might produce good works that God prepared beforehand that we should accomplish (Eph. 2:8-10). Foremost, such works include both the Great Commandment ("You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind" and "your neighbor as yourself." Matthew 22:36-40) and the Great Commission ("Go therefore and make disciples of all nations..." Matt. 28:18-20). Furthermore, we have the assurance of God's presence and provision to enable us, both individually and corporately, to achieve our task (Matt. 28:20b). It is my firm conviction, therefore, that if we keep our common identity and our common goals foremost in our minds and hearts, by the grace of God we can, and will, achieve the purpose for which God has planted Tabernacle Baptist Church here in New Bern.


The Jane Train is leaving for CentriKid Camp June 15 and returning the 19th.

Our Unity Ministry is moving forward, leaving behind the interruption and damage caused by last year's storm. We are thankful for our volunteers and all who have contributed to the Ministry. We have been seeking additional cooks for our twice-weekly Meal Ministry (Mondays and Thursdays, 5 - 6pm), and have now been blessed by the recent commitment of Loisann Atkinson to fill one of the roles. Our numbers, for the meals we serve, have been erratic, but are showing an increase in average attendance. When we first reopened, the number of children attending was noticeably down, but those numbers are also improving significantly.

We seek to serve God by serving others. The Gospel controls our message-meals but, by serving food, we attempt to remedy the fearful distraction and eventual desperation resulting from hunger. Additionally, in our client interactions, we seek to supplement the essential offerings of sustenance and devotion with examples of Christian behavior which, hopefully, model the instructional Word given to us by our Living God. We seek and always welcome volunteers having a serving heart.

With the meals, we also provide our Clothes Closet. Since our reopening we have begun offering it twice per week, on both Mondays and Thursdays, whereas we previously opened it on

Thursdays alone. We have been blessed with increased amounts of donated clothing, but we are "moving it" faster than ever. Thus, we can use all summer clothing, but particularly men's clothing and socks, children's clothing, and sheets and towels.



Our Food Pantry grocery giveaways also continue on the second and fourth Mondays each month, from 2 - 4pm. We greatly appreciate all donations which supplement the items we receive from Panera Bread and the Food Bank. We want to specifically note (and thank) the Pre-School for donations of food and children's clothing. Going forward, we particularly need canned meats, as we seek to assure the delivery of protein to our client children.

Please pray for all of our Church ministries. Please pray for our Unity Ministry, that we will successfully provide - to the needy within our reach - the Gospel message, invoking God's saving work, and respite from physical and spiritual hunger.






